

## Report for 2012

#### **Overview**

In 2012 The Northeast Regional Center for Rural Development (NERCRD) was able to build on and further strengthen its collaborative networks. The Center was instrumental in developing and submitting three new competitive grant proposals. These additional grants support new research and outreach in areas that complement existing Center goals and programs, and have the potential to increase its impacts significantly. Through these networks, The Center has achieved a level of cooperation and collaboration among different grant recipients that is unprecedented in USDA's funding history within the subject area. Each of these grants addresses the issue of better connecting farmers and consumers and in the process achieving rural and agricultural economic development objectives. Of particular note, we are grateful to be collaborating directly or indirectly with Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) members C. Brown, K. Liang and S. Tubene on three of these grants. 
In addition to working closely with Extension educators and faculty in selected communities of the Northeast through these and other projects, we have been contacted by private foundations seeking to collaborate with The Center. These often place-based funders recognize that their resources are limited in the face of overwhelming needs, that they have to collaborate to succeed, and that they cannot afford to reinvent the wheel in each of the communities in which they work. Collaborating with The Center and its partners who are funded with federal grants could be a major advantage to these funders for effecting change. At the same time, our own projects benefit from the contacts as well as the community-level resources that these private foundations can provide, potentially creating a strong win-win situation for both sides.

#### **Extension and Outreach**

We continue to make strides with our Extension and outreach efforts across the region. For example, The Center was instrumental in expanding the Foundations of Practice in community and economic development from the regional to the national levels, and two former Center extension associates are leading a CED Community of Practice that was launched while they were still employed by The Center. We also played a key role in creating a Community, Local and Regional Food Systems national community of practice; the \$5mn AFRI GFS grant will serve to generate research results that will then be translated and shared through this COP. We were able to bring in other GFS grant recipients from the 2011 funding cycle into this initiative, which will further strengthen the underlying research base. Another center collaborator is helping us to shed light on the determinants of food access, with a selected paper presented at the AAEA/EAEA symposium held at Tufts University earlier this year.

<sup>\*</sup>Enhancing Food Security in the Northeast; shaded (heavy) circles indicate that The NERCRD leads the effort as PI/Director


Falcon-; GFS= global food security; PRC=policy research center; CBG=capacity building grant (1890 institutions)

One important impact we are able to claim is the greater recognition among Extension leaders, educators and practitioners in the Northeast of the role that networks and network analysis can play in strengthening regional food systems. Because networks are pervasive and network principles are almost universally applicable, network science can provide powerful insights in all



areas of Extension.<sup>2</sup> Among other invitations to make presentations on this topic, the Center's director was asked to discuss his experience with developing a network of collaborators from multiple disciplines for the purpose of competitive grant applications (e.g., in invasive species).



In addition, Center staff made original contributions to the growing area of network science. This included estimating where food hubs should optimally be located in the Northeast region under alternative scenarios of population growth, changing traffic congestion, and shifting

production patterns. This work was presented as a poster by a post-doc at the Agricultural and Applied Economics Association annual meeting. At that meeting the director also served as a discussant at the post-conference professional development conference on assessing the local economic impact of agriculture and local foods production. Another original contribution has been estimating latent or workplace-to-workplace migration from overlapping commuting and migration networks.

#### **NERCRD Selected to Lead New National Rural Policy Research Center**

The nation's four Regional Rural Development Centers (RRDCs) were recently chosen by the National Institute of Food and Agriculture/United States Department of Agriculture to establish


the National Agricultural and Rural Development Policy Center (or NARDeP). NARDeP is funded through NIFA's competitive grants program at a level of \$768,000 over 24 months, and it will provide policy makers with timely and unbiased information on a variety of topics, including rural



families, households, and economies; farm and agricultural sectors; consumers, food, and nutrition; and environment. The Northeast Regional Center for Rural Development at Pennsylvania State University serves as lead project coordinator. #### **Economic Power of Self-Employment Felt in Rural Counties**

A new Center study finds that people in rural counties who work for themselves may add a boost to local economies, improving income and job growth county-wide: The share of self-employed workers in non-metro counties significantly predicts personal income and job growth, as well as reductions in family poverty levels. Co-authored with Dr. Anil Rupasingha, research economist and policy advisor at the Federal Reserve Bank in Atlanta, the study appears in *Papers in Regional Science*. Working with Penn State Cooperative Extension as well as other Extension services in the region, we are developing educational curricula for development in rural communities to increase awareness of the opportunities that are created by self-employment.

We have initiated discussions with faculty colleagues to provide support to the Pennsylvania Firm Innovation Network (PA FIN). Although based in Pennsylvania, this network has members from across the United States.
